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SECTION D

NEW BRITISH ALPHABET COMPETITION

D.1-D.543

This section contains material relating to Sir James Pitman's involvement with the New British Alphabet Competition. As a result of his interest in and enthusiasm for spelling reform Sir James Pitman was appointed advisor to the Public Trustee under the terms of the will of George Bernard Shaw (1856-1950). His duties in this capacity included participation in the administration and judging of a competition proposed by Shaw to design an improved, more economical alphabet for every day longhand writing.

Over 400 entries from all over the world, ranging from published texts to single sides of writing paper, are presented in this section. Four designs were initially announced to be of outstanding merit and after discussion between the four successful entrants and the competition assessors an amended alphabet was finally evolved. The resulting 'Shaw Alphabet', first published in a Penguin edition of Shaw's play 'Androcles and the Lion', was generally considered to be an experimental success if not a popular one.

The section also contains material relating to Shaw's use of shorthand for notes and correspondence and a dispute over the validity of certain clauses of his will.

D.1-D.31 GEORGE BERNARD SHAW'S WILL 1950-1967

This sub-section contains material relating to the will of George Bernard Shaw. Shaw left the residue of his estate to trustees for the promotion of a 'New British Alphabet' to be designed to reduce the costs, time and effort involved in writing longhand. The trustees of the British Museum, also a beneficiary, contested the will, arguing that if it could be proved that such an alphabet would be of no real advantage to the general public, money set aside to fund an alphabet competition should be bestowed upon the Museum instead.

In February 1957 Mr Justice Harman found against the validity of the will and consequently no part of Shaw's estate could legally be used to facilitate the design and use of a new alphabet. After lengthy negotiations, however, it was finally agreed that a sum of money should be paid by the British Museum and other residuary legatees to the Public Trustee for the purpose of carrying out Shaw's wishes with regard to the development of an alternative alphabet. The Public Trustee appointed a committee of experts to advise him on this matter. Sir James Pitman was a member of the committee.
